The Palos Park chapter sent 11 delegates to the Palos convention, 9 delegates to the Parma convention, and 3 delegates to the Northampton Convention.



VERY REVEREND VOLODYMYR BUKATA AWARD- 2005 MARC SENEDAK





He maintains the parish votive candles and works for the parish catering services. We were still able to hold Divine Liturgy every Sunday and even had our church school classes and weekly coffee hour, although they both took place in the upstairs of the hall. Within a few months, the downstairs of our hall was useable. Although the plaster is peeling and it is not close to what it used to be, we do use it for coffee hour, meetings, cooking, and so much more.

We have come so far in one year. The members of our parish have been working so hard to make our church everything it used to be, and more. We have formed several committees to help guide the work being done. This year the children of our parish will also be in their regular church school rooms, which take place in the downstairs of our church. Although it is not yet finished down there, it will be good to have our classrooms back. The juniors and children are also doing anything they can to aid in the flood relief. Not long after the flood, we were in the church helping with cleaning-up and many of us also helped with the scraping of the plaster off the walls.

Two years ago, at our 100th anniversary, we never would have thought that there would be a flood in Carnegie, but with the help of God we are overcoming our challenges. There are nothing but good things to come with the restoration of our church. I pray that God will help us in the continuation of our flood efforts and that we will succeed in all that we do as a parish.

Thank you all for your thoughts and prays the past year. I know that what we do here in Carnegie will surely be the start of our next great 100 years as a parish. ORTHODOX CHRISTIANS IN AMERICA . . . We Are Different!

As the UOL Convention comes to a close and its members return to the Ukrainian Orthodox parishes of the USA, it is time for each member to reflect upon the question: "Who Are We?" A dear friend and convert of Orthodox said to me recently, "the Orthodox are America's most counter-cultural Christian religion." As I thought about our role in American society, I was convinced that our greatest threat is conformity and dilution, so that we don't appear to be different from everyone else. But the truth is that we are uniquely different and in order to survive, we must preserve our Faith, our moral code and our culture intact.

First of all, we are members of the Body of Christ, the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church of the First Century united in Faith around the Holy Eucharist for the purpose of salvation, eternal life and support of each other in the face of earthly tribulations. As baptized members of Christ's Holy Church and sealed with the gifts of the Holy Spirit, we are blessed with the unique opportunity to serve God in spirit and in truth. But this also means that we have a serious responsibility to carry out Christ's mission on earth as his disciples. Our Faith is a personal commitment to Jesus Christ, the founder and head of our church, who said, "No one comes to the Father except through Me." In following Christ, we become an uncommon and different people.

The Orthodox Faith is not a religious category, but a total way of life. It involves our whole being in the daily struggle against sin and the Evil One in an attempt to achieve communion with God. From conception to the grave, the individual soul is confronted with the choices of good and evil as we make our way from this land of the dying to the land of the living. But Orthodox Christianity has given us a treasure of gifts to live this life in holiness and truth. Everything in life can be a Holy Mystery filled with the Spirit of God through Grace.

By meditating upon the Holy Scriptures and writings of the Holy Fathers, by participating in the Divine Services with fellow believers, by praying silently through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, and by living the Holy tradition we maintain a living continuity with the Apostolic Church. No church is so blessed with the indwelling of the Holy Spirit. But we need to preserve its very essence. Here stand UOL members, the vanguard of the Faith in North America. They must be the shining lights of the True Faith in both word and deed. And they must defend Orthodox Christianity amidst the cries for compromise and change which will make us just another sect.

There are practical applications of this commitment to the Faith we must make. First, we need to immerse ourselves in the wealth of liturgical services that have sustained our Faith for 2,000 years. No church has a daily, weekly, and festal cycle of services as does the Orthodox Church. We must actively engage ourselves in the Hours, Matins, Vespers, Compline, and Divine Liturgies. In this context, we must have more people willing to step up and commit to become readers, subdeacons, deacons, monks and nuns. In addition, we must relentlessly preserve the services as they have been handed down, without complaining about their length or frequency or seeking to reduce their content to conform to others. Our services do not have too many "Lord, have mercies," our most common and sacred prayer.

Secondly, we need to cherish the expression of our Faith which define us as Orthodox Christians. The sign of the cross with three fingers, veneration of the Holy Icons and Relics, the burning of incense, prostrations during the Canon of Andrew of Crete and St. Ephraim's Prayer, standing during services, the Pre-Sanctified Liturgies, All Souls Saturdays, the four fasting seasons as well as Wednesdays and Fridays, and honor to the Theotokos, the Birth-giver of God are but a few of the attributes which tell people **who we are**. In addition, we should become aware of the many services that can be found in the **Book of Needs** and avail ourselves of them during the year. The blessing of all objects from animals to vehicles, the prayer for a woman who has suffered a miscarriage, the service for military personnel going off to war, a moleben during an epidemic, and blessing of a foundation for a new house, are some of the ways Orthodox live a life in communion with God through Christ everyday.

Next, we must be keenly aware that we are a hierarchical church and that Christ gave authority to the Apostles, who in turn ordained the first bishops and priests of the Church. These spiritual leaders sustain our Faith and guide us in the ethical and moral dilemmas of our time. To them we must give respect and obedience. The issues in this amoral society, from abortion, homosexuality, divorce, euthanasia, cloning, and stem cell research need to be clarified and defined in a truly Christian context.

Finally, our Orthodox Faith is lived out in a particular cultural milieu. We are citizens of the USA and most of us speak English as our first language. But Orthodoxy has blended the customs of many different nations into its living Faith. Aleuts and Arabs, Ethopians and Greeks, Japanese and Ukrainians all have unique customs, which have embellished the Orthodox Faith. For those of us of Ukrainian descent, we offer some of these customs to American Orthodoxy. Putting embroidered rushniki around holy icons, blessing Paschal baskets, carving frozen ice crosses on Theopany, bringing fruits to church on the Transfiguration, and presenting the korovai to the bishop when he visits our church are examples of Ukrainian traditions which need to be preserved and shared with the other Orthodox traditions.

Above all, we Orthodox of North America, must stand unshakable and united in the profession of our Faith, realizing that we have the True Faith, and although we are different from the majority around us, we can be a beacon of light and hope. We Are Different!

UKRAINIIAN FOLKLORE: FUNERALS

There were very special rituals for burial in old Ukraine. Since the soul of the deceased was thought to remain in the home, someone had to sit with the body at all times. Water and Kolyvo (wheat cooked with honey) was placed on a nearby table for the soul. The departed was mourned by lamenting and wailing at home, on the way to the cemetery, and at the gravesite. These poetic laments varied according to the relationship between the survivor and the departed. Thus, a daughter of the mother recited:

"O mother, my dearest mother In which direction shall I look for you? When will you come visit me? At Christmas, at Easter, Or on a holy day?"

When a young unmarried man or woman died, the deceased was dressed in wedding attire and was carried to the cemetery in an open coffin. A Korovai (decorated wedding bread) was placed on the coffin lid. The ornaments of dough were later distributed to the mourners. Ribbons from the head of the deceased girl were given to her friends. Upon the death of a young man, his boutonniere was given to his friends.

When the wreath was placed on the deceased girl's head before the funeral procession, her girlfriends lamented:

"O dearest friend, out little dove! Where are you going, when will you return? Why have you stopped smiling? Why are you not looking at us?"

When Ukrainians immigrated to America, they brought with them many of the burial rites which continued through the early 1900's. The coffin containing the body was brought to the home where it remained until the time of burial. All mirrors were covered with cloth and no music or loud talking was permitted in the home. Family and friends kept vigil both day and night, and the priest would come to the home for parastas. The widow wore black for a year, and the widower a lack band on his arm.

Burial rites may have changed through the years, but the love for our departed remains forever.
