Wilmington Retreat Submitted by Ann Duncan and Sonya Patronik

On Saturday, October 13, 2018, under the guidance of our spiritual father and pastor, Fr. Stephen Hutnick, the Senior UOL Chapter of Ss. Peter & Paul Ukrainian Orthodox Church in Wilmington, Delaware, presented their annual retreat attended by parishioners from Wilmington, Dover and Philadelphia. This year the featured speaker was the Very Reverend Archpriest Andrew Stephen Damick, pastor of St. Paul Antiochian Orthodox Church of Emmaus, Pennsylvania. Father Andrew is the well known author of several books including the popular "Orthodoxy and Heterodoxy." He is also the author of "Roads to Emmaus" blog and podcasts on Ancient Faith Ministries (https://blogs.ancientfaith.com/roadsfromemmaus).

The retreat opened with a continental breakfast prepared by UOL members followed by an Akathist for Our Youth. Fr. Andrew's first presentation was An Introduction to God - Encountering the Divine in Orthodox Christianity.

Fr. Andrew explained that God introduces Himself into a place of humility, and we must make ourselves available in a place of humility. What you bring to an encounter bears greatly on what will result from that encounter. Many times we want something from God. He is with us just because we are ourselves; we must consider if we are with God just because He is our God or am I with Him because I want something? Meeting God is not casual; we must prepare our hearts and minds. We must repent, that is, open ourselves to receive God.

Next addressed was the idea of knowing if you are connecting with God. If you only ask for things, you are just present with your ego. Consider someone who you love being with and are very happy in their presence. We grow



and become better just by being with them. Likewise, are we happy just being with God and does that change us for the better? A synopsis of this session simply stated is, "You can't be full of God if you're full of yourself." God reveals Himself to individuals, if we quiet ourselves, standing in wonder and become humble. God is present anywhere humans allow Him to be.

When encouraging people to come to our church, find a way to communicate that it's not just the surface, such as music, icons, etc. A more successful approach is asking someone to come struggle with you as you search for God.

Questions answered by Fr. John Harvey of Blessed Memory

At times I have such vivid dreams filled with omens and portents. I feel that this is some kind of spiritual blessing although I don't feel exactly that I am a psychic. I have kept quiet about this until now, but I would like to hear your comments.

On the subject of clairvoyance the church has always been very conservative and reluctant to approve or encourage, with good reason. In the 1970's a lady in Bulgaria became known as a seer and her pronouncements attracted Communist officials, some clergy and many peasants. She became quite a controversial figure (and still is after death). Many of her predictions did not come true, which puts her under the Old Testament ban of false prophet. To be a true prophet or seer, 100% of sayings must come true.

Locally I know of a lady, who really exuded a spiritual aura which attracted a whole coterie of followers. Some of the things that the Lord supposedly directed her to say caused great hurt to some people and the result was not a spiritual plus. I am not doubting her good will, but The evil one can feed us delusions to entrap us or those with whom we speak.

Scripture warns us that even if an angel of light appears to you in a vision you must be very careful and test the spirits. I am afraid, most of us are not that discerning to do that job well and so we might easily fall into prelest.

Prelest is a tool of Satan. If one can misguide or confuse folks it is of an advantage to the evil one. We might think that the Holy Spirit is directing us, but it could be some evil spirit putting forth a delusionary message.

Several monastic saints were clairvoyant, although they certainly did not desire to be. Such messages were usually given to penitents or those who came for advice and for their betterment.

In your case, although you may consider this to be a spiritual gift, it may just be the evil one pumping you up to delude you and others. With even a small success, you might be led into the murky world of prelest.

It is better for you to pray that this supposed "gift" be taken from you and that you be left in spiritual peace.

As you read these wonderful answers please remember Fr. John Harvey of Blessed Memory in your prayers. Vichnaya Pamyat!

2018 L.S.S.K. Scholarship Recipients Submitted by Anna Anderson

At the Annual UOL Convention that was held in South Bound Brook, NJ in conjunction with the 100th Anniversary of the UOC of the USA, the Lynn Sawchuk-Sharon Kuzbyt Memorial Scholarship Committee awarded scholarships to outstanding Junior UOL members whose dedication to the Church and the League went above and beyond the norm.

The scholarship was established int 1975 to perpetuate the memory of two lovely, dynamic young women whose untimely deaths left an indelible mark in the life of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church. In the last 43 years, the UOL has awarded 150 Scholarships totaling over \$180,000.

The Scholarship Committee considers the following criteria when reviewing applicants: being a current or past member of the Junior UOL; enrolled in or about to enroll into a program of advanced education; a record of outstanding performance in the service to the Holy Ukrainian Orthodox Church and the UOL; academic performance in high school; involvement in extracurricular activities and being of high and moral character. This year we awarded scholarships to two deserving young men with scholarships totaling \$5,000.

Jeffrey Senediak, of Youngstown, OH, is the son of Mike and Carol Senediak. Jeffrey exemplified the characteristics for consideration for the L.S.S.K. through his high academic accomplishments by holding a 4.0 all the way through high school which included many college advanced courses. This outstanding academic performance earned him the position of Valedictorian of his senior class. He was involved in many school activities including National Honor Society, Spanish Club, Interact, PTA and Health Professions Affinity Community. He was a member of the baseball and basketball teams, as well. He was elected as vice president of his senior class. In his church life, he faithfully served (and continues to serve) as an altar server, attended Church School regularly and was a member of the Junior UOL for 6 years. In that time, he served as treasurer, vice-president and president. As president, he spearheaded different charitable projects including raising money for a local Youth Crisis Center. Jeffrey volunteered his time to bake pies and serve meals at the local food kitchen. His outstanding service to his church and community made him an excellent candidate for the L.S.S.K. scholarship.


Jeffrey is attending Youngstown State University majoring in Mechanical Engineering.

Pre-K and Kindergarten: Draw a picture of something you like to do with your family.

Grades 1 and 2: One of the Nine Fruits of the Holy Spirit is Compassion. Write 2 to 3 sentences explaining what compassion is and draw a picture of someone showing compassion to something or someone.

Grades 3 and 4: In Proverbs 1: 8-9 the Bible says, "Hear, my son, your father's instruction, and forsake not your mother's teaching..." Write 50 to 100 words explaining what this passage means to you.

Grades 5 and 6: One of the seven acts of Spiritual Mercy is to forgive all who injure us. Write 100 to 150 words on how you were taught to do this and how you continue to follow that teaching.

Grades 7 and 8: In Proverbs 20:11 the Bible says, "Even a child makes himself known by his acts, by whether his conduct is pure and upright." Write 150 to 200 words on how this relates to this year's convention theme from Proverbs 22:6: "Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it" and accepting responsibility for one's actions.

Grades 9 and 10: In John 1:4 the Bible says, "I have no greater joy than to hear that my children are walking in the truth." Write 200 to 250 words on how this relates to this year's convention theme: "Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it." – Proverbs 22:6.

Grades 11 and 12: Please write 250 to 500 words on the following topic. As you look forward into the upcoming years and getting ready for college, how do you plan on using what you have learned from your parents and from church teachings in your new environment? How do you plan on staying involved in the church?

Adults 18 and over: Write 500 or more words on the following topic. This year's convention theme comes from Proverbs 22:6: "Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it." We have been taught about the Seven Capital Sins and their Opposite Virtues, which are: 1. Pride/Humility 2. Greed/Kindness 3. Lust/Chastity (body and soul) 4. Envy/Charity 5. Gluttony/Liberality 6. Anger/Patience 7. Sloth/Diligence in service and praise of God. In today's world where pride, love of money and a self-centered universe are the norm, how do we use these virtues as a guideline for training up our children?

After a tasty lunch served by UOL members, a session of Stump the Priests was held in the church hall. The three panel priests were Fr. Damick; Fr. Mark Kozak of Assumption of St. Mary, OCA parish in Philadelphia; and Fr. Mina of St. Mary Coptic Orthodox parish in Newark, Delaware. Many thought-provoking questions were asked and the panel gave instructive answers. Fr. Kozak is well known to Ss Peter & Paul members as he served our parish before being assigned to his current church in Philadelphia. It was wonderful to hear Fr. Mina's contribution to the retreat.

Next came the afternoon conference, Fr. Andrew's presentation of The Mystery of Worship - Why Go to Church? Humans have a desire to connect. We bear a likeness to what we worship. Idolatry is the chasing of fantasy; worshipping idols makes us similar to idols. Worshiping God makes us similar to God.

For years, worship involved blood, such as the sacrifice of animals. The life of all is in its blood and the giving of blood is for making atonement of the soul. The blood had a sacrifice and became holy by sitting on the altar. It was also sprinkled on people, both Jews and pagans. Christians have the body and blood of Christ.

In the Bible, there was no spontaneous worship. Those who break from our ritualistic worship are just following pop culture. In the sermon, the person presiding over the service entreats all to act like those who came before--the apostles, saints, etc. Mankind was not created to be alone, as when God created Eve to be with Adam. Likewise, we do not worship alone; we worship together.

After each session there was time for questions and answers to clarify the information provided. The day wrapped up with Vespers and travelers' blessing. All who attended were left with much information to ponder and a renewal of faith!
