Glory to Jesus Christ!

We are in my favorite season of the year. I love putting up Christmas decorations, preparing the church for the upcoming feast days, looking at beautifully decorated houses; the whole bit. I love the comfort foods and bundling up in cold weather. It is a season of cold weather, a season of holiday rush, and it's also the season of giving.

In Acts, we read, "it is better to give, than to receive." I would bet we all make some sort of effort to give. Whether we are throwing coins into the Salvation Army kettle or slipping a couple of dollars to the homeless person we pass on the street. This extra help fills our hearts with a feeling of joy and gratitude. But often we overlook, why we are giving in the first place: to satisfy a great need.

When my husband and I hosted three orphans from Ukraine the littlest boy, Nestor, had food insecurities. How this affected him has stayed with me to this day. On a daily basis, he would open our pantry to see if there was food. It took a couple of days for us to notice this and to understand the purpose of it. I would ask him if he's hungry and he would say no but he still checked for food. I never wanted to pry too much into their home life because I was afraid of saying something triggering. But if they would mention something, I would follow up with a question or two and then move onto something else. One day I asked the oldest about what foods they would eat at home. What she told me put a lump in my throat. First let me note by saying that all of these children were under the age of 5 at home ALONE. Victoria continued to tell me that they always had a bowl of sour cream in the fridge. So they would take turns dipping their fingers in the sour cream when they got hungry. She added that on one occasion when they were really hungry, they would scrape the ice off the inside of the freezer. Hearing this made me understand why Nestor would check the pantry. He needed the reassurance of knowing the food was still there.

According to the Food Research & Action Center, 1 in 8 households in the US experienced food insecurity in 2022. Those households include 44.2 million Americans. My husband and I saw first hand what food insecurity does to a child. But sadly, he is not the only one to face this issue. By now, you should have received information on a Food Drive that the UOL is encouraging of its members and friends in commemoration of the 90th Anniversary of the Holodomor in Ukraine. We know what our ancestors suffered through the famine in Ukraine. But this is still continuing around the world. If you can continue to collect food items throughout the Nativity season, I implore you to do so. There's a huge need for it!

This however isn't the only effort we have to feed the hungry. As you know, we have Souper Bowl Sunday coming up. All proceeds collected from this event go to support the efforts of St. Andrew Society. If you haven't participated before, do it in 2024. All you have to do is make a pot of soup, sell it to your friends, and send the money in to the UOL Financial Secretary Oleh Bilynsky. We will forward all collected money to St. Andrew Society at our Annual Convention in the summer. Last year, we collected over \$10,000. Please help us make 2024 our biggest year yet!!

So far, I have mentioned two ways the UOL is physically feeding the hungry: through our Food Drive and through Souper Bowl Sunday. Two projects that address physical hunger. Coming up soon we will be offering webinars, Praying Our Way, and Lenten Retreats to feed our spiritual hunger. Make a point to participate in at least one of these great opportunities. If you can do more, great! Join us for spiritual refreshment and fellowship. You won't be disappointed.

As usual, I want to thank you for supporting the UOL. This lay organization is the pulse of every parish within our diocese. If you're not involved, get involved. If you don't know how, I'm happy to provide ideas. Don't be afraid to try something new or get involved in something that has been working for years. The UOL needs you. The church needs you. We are all called...make sure you answer that call!

Forest Management at All Saints Camp

On Saturday, October 7, 2023, I attended a tree review at All Saints Camp which was also attended by a few Executive Committee members and staff members. All Saints Camp has not had any type of forest management efforts for over forty years, which is a cornerstone of responsible stewardship on any property. This type of project is integral to the long-term health of the forest. My M.S. in Environmental Science from SUNY-ESF came in handy in understanding the plan.

We met in the Dining Hall with representatives from Omega Incorporated for a project overview. John Hudson, a forester, from Omega, outlined the various stages of the initiative and answered questions.

Mr. Hudson explained the concept of silviculture which is “the art and science of controlling the establishment, growth, composition, health, and quality of forests and woodlands to meet the diverse needs and values of landowners and society such as wildlife habitat, timber, water resources, restoration, and recreation on a sustainable basis” (U.S. Forest Service definition).

For the forests on the hill behind the cabins a no harvest zone of about 75 to 100 feet would be observed. Above that zone 45 to 55 trees per acre were eligible to be cut. Omega would remove some of the less desirable trees such as poplars, beeches and maples, but would also be taking some oaks as well. This action would leave a more favorable environment for the oaks to grow, ensuring the forest would thrive in the future.

In the areas on the lower portion of the camp such as around the Dining Hall, cabins, Pavilion, Millennium Building and Amphitheater there were trees marked for cutting for us to review and potentially veto. Trees marked with an X were undesirable trees because they were dead, or represented a fall risk into other trees, or worse buildings.

Mr. Hudson also explained that there were some issues with the vegetation on campus that required attention. The hemlocks around the dining hall and in other areas of the camp were infested with an insect called the Hemlock Woolly Adelgid and would need treatment. The best time to do this would be in the spring. Also, there were some invasive plant species, Japanese stilt grass and Japanese barberry that needed to be controlled. The facilities team is working with Omega and the Department of Forestry to implement a treatment plan.

Saintly Lives

The Life of St. Katherine

The woman who would later be known as St. Katherine of Alexandria began her life as the daughter of the Governor Costus of Egypt, during the reign of Emperor Maxentius (305-313). Living in the capital -- the center of Hellenistic knowledge, Katherine received the most splendid of educations, having studied the works of the finest philosophers and teachers of antiquity. She was beautiful, highly intelligent and had an insatiable thirst for knowledge that surpassed the abilities of her tutors.

Her Mother encouraged her to marry. Young men from the wealthiest families of the empire sought the hand of the beautiful Katherine, but none of them was chosen, Katherine wanted a husband that would surpass her in intelligence, wealth, nobility and beauty.

Katherine's Mother, a secret Christian, took Katherine to her own spiritual father, a Christian monk who introduced her to Jesus Christ. Having listened to Katherine, the elder said that he knew of a Youth, who surpassed her in everything, such that "His beauty was more radiant than the shining of the sun, His wisdom governed all creation, His riches were spread throughout all the world -- this however did not diminish but rather added to the inexpressible loftiness of His lineage." The image of the Heavenly Bridegroom produced an ardent desire in the soul of the holy maiden to see Him. In parting, the elder handed Katherine an icon of the Mother of God with the God-Child Jesus on Her arm and bid her to pray with faith to the Queen of Heaven -- the Mother of the Heavenly Bridegroom -- for the bestowing of the vision of Her Son.

Katherine prayed all night and was blessed to see the Theotokos, Who sent Her Divine Son to look upon the kneeling of Katherine before Them. But the Child turned His face away from her saying, that He was not able to look at her because she was ugly, of shabby lineage, beggarly and mindless like every person -- not washed with the waters of holy Baptism and not sealed with the seal of the Holy Spirit. Katherine was saddened by the dream and went again to see the monk. He lovingly received her and instructed her in the faith of Christ, admonished her to preserve her purity and integrity and to pray unceasingly; he then baptized her. After this Katherine had another vision of the Theotokos with her Child Jesus who looked upon Katherine tenderly and gave her a beautiful ring.

At that time the emperor Maxentius visited Alexandria for a pagan feast day. Because of this, the feast was especially splendid and crowded. The cries of the sacrificial animals, the smoke and the smell of the sacrifices, the endless blazing of fires, and the bustling crowds at the arenas filled Alexandria. Christians were being put to death by being burned alive because they would not

Pre-K and Kindergarten: (Category A)

Grades 1 and 2: (Category B)

renounce their faith in Jesus Christ. Katherine protested to Maxentius the worshipping of idols and the Christian persecutions. Captivated by her beauty Maxentius didn't execute her immediately. In order to convince her and show the superiority of pagan wisdom, he instead assembled a group of fifty philosophers to debate her on the issue of idolatry. She was so effective in the debate that all fifty of them were converted to Christianity and asked to be baptized. St Katherine shielded the martyrs with the sign of the cross, and they bravely accepted death for Christ. They were immediately put to death by being burned alive. The emperor, impressed by her beauty and intelligence, wanted her to deny her faith and marry him. He tried to entice her with the promise of riches and fame. Katherine angrily refused him and was beaten and tortured.

The Empress Valeria had heard about Katherine and wanted to see the woman who defied her husband. She went with the military commander Porphyrios to the prison where Katherine was being kept with two hundred soldiers. When they arrived, Katherine's face glowed with Divine grace. She explained the Christian faith to them, and they were converted to Christ. The next day they again brought Katherine to the judgement court where, under the threat of being broken on the wheel, they urged that she recant from the Christian faith and offer sacrifice to the gods. She refused and was taken to be tortured on four wheels with sharp spikes. Faced with this torture she did not renounce her Christian Faith.

Before she could be placed on the wheel, an Angel smashed it and it shattered to pieces. The Empress Valeria, Porphyrios and the soldiers having witnessed this miracle confessed their faith and were beheaded. Maxentius once again entreated Katherine to marry him, and she again refused, firmly confessed her fidelity to the Heavenly Bridegroom -- Christ, and she as well was beheaded by the sword. The relics of Saint Katherine were taken to Mount Sinai by Angels and were found by a revelation in the sixth century. The head of the holy martyr and her left hand with the ring still on it were revealed. Her relics were transferred to the church of the Monastery on Mount Sinai.

His Eminence Metropolitan Antony shared the history of the UOL and its many accomplishments. He also provided feedback based on ideas presented.

Several themes and ideas emerged during the discussion:

Encourage community engagement.

Develop a presentation about the UOL that can be shared with parishes. Marianne Carmack reported that she developed a presentation that was used by Karen Ferraro, past President at the Clergy Conference. She will share this presentation with the group.

Focus exclusively on support for All Saints Camp and education about the camp to our UOC faithful.

Develop a calendar of events where UOC parishes can participate – similar to the participation in the Souper Bowl Sunday and the UOL Essay Contest. A sample of events includes:

Thanksgiving – Commemoration of the Holodomor - Collect food for food bank

Nativity Lent – Praying our Way (readings during the fast)

Post Nativity – Coffee Hour with Caroling - Fundraise for All Saints Camp

Souper Bowl Sunday – St. Andrew Society

Retreats

Lent – Pray our Way – Psalms

Education Contest

Met. John Scholarship Fundraiser – Panakhyda for Met. John and having a Collection/ Coffee Hour for MJSF

Focus the UOL on helping Ukraine war efforts by joining organizations that are teaching English to new immigrants and also to Ukrainians in Ukraine. Information about this organization – ENGIN – Helping Ukraine Speak to the World.

Increase fellowship activities within regions. Plan social activities within regions so that UOC faithful can develop bonds between parishes.

Review the Convention structure and develop workshops/groups that focus on topics to help parishes. These could be around certain groups – religious education, choir, or topics that would help a parish.


